# Letter from the Abbot

In our monastic refectory we have been listening to Massimo Faggioli, a professor of theology at Villanova University. An Italian native, the observations in his book center on polar perspectives that he has seen emerge both in our nation and in the Catholic church. Passionate but discordant voices want to guide and shape the future of both the nation and of the Catholic church. Many care deeply. But he notes that unreflective ardor only produces scenes like the incursion into our nation's Capitol or storms in our streets. Constraints resulting from the coronavirus have only exacerbated tensions. Wisdom will be needed to find a path that safeguards tradition, addresses grievances and envisions a bright future for both our church and our nation.

This letter is an invitation to our alumni and to our students to be trailblazers. Blessed with intelligence, education, opportunity and resources, these young men will become leaders in our communities both locally and nationally. As Catholic and Benedictine educators, we have a responsibility to speak the truth in which we believe. Our starting point is our faith in Jesus Christ and values we find in the Rule of St Benedict. It is our duty to instill in these young men a well-prepared sense of moral duty. The values of community, hospitality, moderation, integrity, and service are guideposts. Mount Michael has become a microcosm of the diversity in our world. We have discovered that students who work and live together see one another as individuals; respecting and appreciating world views that may differ from their own. We live in community because community provides feedback which alerts us to missteps. We want our students to be critical thinkers and lifelong learners. A singular reliance on media which reinforce one's already narrow convictions will not produce a foundation for making good moral choices. We want our students and our alumni to be confident and self-reliant, assuming responsibility for their behavior. We want them to be rational, reflective, and thoughtful. We want them to have a respect for the truth. Both faith and facts matter.

We would like to think that our alumni and students can imagine, create, and implement transformative change which fosters life, liberty, freedom, and the pursuit of happiness for all. We believe that they have the tools to forge a hopeful future. We hope that our students and alumni will bolster the disadvantaged, promote equality, and ensure access of all citizens of this country to the gifts of God. We would like to think that their faith in God will inform decisions they make. It is perhaps too much to dream that we can settle all the problems that have beset us currently. But it is not too much to hope that students and alumni of Mount Michael will do everything in their power to make this a better world for all.

# DEAR MOUNT MICHAEL COMMUNITY,

Mount Michael Benedictine School has been working on a series of aspirations and goals tied to our 2020-2025 strategic plan.

Our teachers are currently working on *Aspiration 4-Support Teaching and Learning:* "We will deepen our traditional academic strength while broadening our curriculum and recruiting and retaining the best faculty and staff to prepare aspirational and thoughtful global thinkers." Goal 2 of this aspiration states: Review the school curriculum, including both available and required courses, to give students greater flexibility while still holding to our core requirements and following our mission of preparing them for college.

One content area that will be seeing some changes next year is the social studies department. American Government, which is a sophomore course, will be replaced with Civics. This class will cover much of the American Government course but also focus on the responsibilities of being a United States citizen. There will be two new AP classes: AP US Government and Politics and AP Human Geography. The Human Geography course will focus on populations and migrations, cultural patterns, political organization, agriculture and rural land use, industrialization, economic development and cities and urban land use. Other electives that we will be adding are Psychology (not AP), American Diversity and Holocaust Studies.

The English department has modified their senior English course allowing students to have more choices. The new areas of focus will be British Literature, Philosophy and Literature, Horror and the Supernatural, Dystopian Literature, and Individual vs Society literature. There will also be a new Creative Writing elective. These expansions will allow students to grow in their appreciation for different literary forms.

Over the past two years we have changed the science curriculum by adding a new AP Physics course and an Applied Biology and Chemistry course. Our math and theology programs will stay the same as they have been these past few years. The theology curriculum is the one required by the USCCB (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops).

One area we have transformed over the past three years is engineering. Currently we offer an Architectural/Engineering introduction class for freshmen. The sophomore students can take Honors Residential Engineering. As juniors, these students can take Honors Commercial Engineering and as seniors, they can take the capstone Honors Engineering course.

Currently, we are assessing other areas of the curriculum. One central area we will be working on is the fine arts. This was a specific area highlighted in the strategic plan. An expansion in the arts will be forthcoming. In reviewing and assessing our curriculum many times it becomes a balance. Because of our size we are limited in the number of classes we can offer. We operate on a nine-period day and we understand that we need to balance our course offerings against time. Every course offering is important, and we want it to have impact. We have an over-all curriculum committee that looks at all these offerings and the potential impact to our schedule and to our students. We balance areas and offerings that we feel will resonate with a student and have impact. These choices can be difficult.

As we go through this process, I have seen faculty members energized and excited about the future. Taking time to see what we teach, and why we teach what we teach, can be very empowering. As an institution we do not want to be complacent. We need to look to the future while also valuing our current fundamental curriculum and ideals. It takes a lot of assessment and judgement. I am proud of where we are and where we are headed.

Thank you for your constant support of Mount Michael Benedictine School. We would not be here if it were not for the support of our alumni, donors, parents, students, staff, and faculty.

# St. Joseph

In Chapter 49 of the Rule, St Benedict begins by writing that the life of a monk ought to be a continuous Lent. But with typical wisdom, he immediately observes that few monks have the strength for that commitment. The church seems to share St Benedict's insight. Lent is interrupted by a trio of celebrations in the middle of March – St Patrick, father of Irish Christianity; St Benedict, father of western monasticism; and St Joseph father of the universal church. In the church's calendar, March 19 is officially the solemnity of St Joseph, spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. A husband, a father provides his family with love, strength, example and a willingness to sacrifice. Sadly, our world knows too well how a family can suffer when a husband and father is absent.

There are unusual statues of St Joseph which show him asleep. No accident. It is in sleep that we dream. Like sleep, dreams are not well understood. Startled, we wake from a dream, and reality seems a foreign world. Scientifically, dreams appear to be neural processes that our brains undertake to help process emotions. Psychologically, we believe that dreams give insight into the workings of our subconscious. Spiritually, dreams are interpreted as bearing messages from God. St Joseph is inextricably linked to the Joseph of the Old Testament who was sold into slavery by his jealous brothers. The Joseph of the Old Testament comes to the notice of Pharaoh because of an ability to interpret dreams. Joseph becomes second only to Pharaoh in Egypt. When famine threatens Joseph's father Jacob and his brothers and their families, he comes to their rescue

providing for them in Egypt. St Joseph had a dream which told him that he and Mary should flee into Egypt to escape the deadly intentions of King Herod. Both Josephs acted to ensure that God's salvific activity would not be thwarted. St John Chrysostom wrote that St Joseph placed himself "at the service of the entire plan of salvation." He did so resolutely, discreetly, without fanfare and without expectation of reward.

Often, we use the word dream to speak about an ideal. We dream of being in love. We dream of what we would like for Christmas. Martin Luther King dreamed of a better world. Free at last, free at last. Thank God in heaven I am free at last. St Joseph dreamed that God would visit his people. God would not be found in a burning bush. God would not be found on a mountain top accompanied by earthquakes, thunder and lightning giving commandments on stone tablets. God would not inhabit a temple as he did in Jerusalem. God would not send a prophet to condemn the wicked and to console exiles. Joseph dreamed of the salvation of the world; God would enter the world as a child, and not just any child. This was to be the child of his own betrothed, Mary of Nazareth. Son of God and son of Mary. That is a big dream. That is a lot to believe. Joseph had to trust in God. Joseph had to trust in Mary. And Mary had to trust in Joseph's dream too. Pope Francis has proclaimed this a "Year of St Joseph". Perhaps that means we should have a dream. A dream of a world united in its pursuit of peace and finding a way to God.

**Greetings Mount Michael Community!** 

As I walked into my office in the DJ Sokol Building the other day, I was greeted with a very familiar, yet unseen face this school year - Fr. John! As our globe

continues its fight against COVID-19, I can't begin to tell you how thankful I am to have the monastic community back in the school building as of March 15th. Any alumnus will tell you how vital the role the monastic community plays in the Mount Michael experience, and for the monks to be back is important, especially for the current freshman who have not even met them yet.

COVID-19 presented serious roadblocks during the recruitment season. Despite being unable to travel to the local Catholic schools and speak to the 8th graders, Mount Michael's leadership put a plan in place for me to welcome parents for individual tours, host limited shadow visits, and even invite 90+ families to attend our annual Open House. This plan allowed for Mount Michael admissions to have one of its most successful years to

date, comprising of over 100 applications and 97 students who sat for our entrance exam in January. After an extremely difficult selection process, we were finally able to sign the official letters of acceptance and invite 79 young men from the Omaha area to join the Mount Michael Class of 2025. Twenty-seven of these students performed well enough on our entrance exam to be awarded a merit-based scholarship, which we presented to them in early February.

I am also thankful that we will be moving forward this summer with all our summer camps! We will be hosting five different athletic camps in the month of June as well as the traditional Camp Mount Michael in July. If you know of any boys that would have interest in attending any of our camps, I ask that you please help my efforts and get them registered as soon as possible!

It is truly an exciting time for this community.

### **WRESTLING**




The wrestling team won the River Cities Conference Championship and had two qualify for State.

# Renewed Efforts for Lots of Beautiful Colors in Mount Michael's Garden

Spring and summer are not far off! Undoubtedly, most people throughout the world are ready for a real change, especially after lock downs, bitterly cold temperatures and cancellations of family events. It is time for bright colors and warm sunshine.

I must say that I am more than ready for lots of change as well, as the weather begins to warm and hints of new life are appearing all around us

here at Mount Michael. In the early days of March, I have already been in the garden planning.

I hope to bring some changes to my gardening efforts this

year. Some things will remain the same, but I intend on going back to some older efforts as well.

The older efforts include going back to the years of emphasizing flowers - cut flowers for arranging purposes. The past few years I have worked with Kathy Kaster, whose son (Max) graduated from Mount Michael last spring - 2020. Kathy now operates *Flower and ArtProject*. She has used a lot of Mount Michael flowers over the past few years at her shop located at 2014 S. 156th Circle in Omaha.

Kathy's style is what I would label a "naturalist." She uses lots of flowers and greenery that most arrangers would not consider using. She has a real eye for what grows naturally and sees the possibility of it working well in an arrangement. For example, when she saunters through the garden, she sees possibilities for using dill sprigs, when it is blooming or when it has seeded. Cilantro sometimes works and even some weeds like foxtail. It is fun to work with a person who

has such an artistic eye and who can create beauty from what one might never consider as beautiful.

When my flowers come into bloom, Kathy or her sister will be on site, here at Mount Michael, making arrangements and perhaps even conducting some classes on flower arranging. We intend to spread the word better this year on the abbey website and will supply information about what is available and what programs will be offered. The Development Office personnel will be helping me in that regard, especially John Von Dollen.

Flowers that I will grow: sunflowers, dahlias, bells of Ireland, zinnias, bachelor buttons, shasta daisies, sweat peas, peonies, celosia, cosmos, even millet and other grasses.

Admittedly, I feel that I have aged a bit during this crazy pandemic and so I know that it will be a little harder for me to do as much as I have in the past. I intend to cut back somewhat on the "veggie" part of the garden this year. Or at least the part about stuffing veggies into jars and canning and preserving. I hope to make that a lesser part. I will still have fresh veggies available as has been in the past.

Vegetables and fruits that I will grow: rhubarb, radishes, kohlrabi, lettuce, spinach, kale, zucchini, cabbage, cucumbers, tomatoes, corn and peppers.

At this writing, the early days of March, I can say that I am excited and looking forward to the growing season, especially with the renewed emphasis on flowers. I have ordered lots of seeds and plan to create a new addition to flower arranging with dahlias. Many years ago, I grew them. Hopefully, I have not lost my touch.

I hope to see you at the Farmer's Market this coming season. Please check out the new information of the abbey website, so that you have a better idea of what is coming and available.

# ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

**SYLVESTER SCHIEBER '64**

Readers of the Michaeleen will know from the previous issue that at the end of 2020, alumnus Sylvester Schieber '64 made a gift to honor a former teacher, Christine Kneifl. He wanted to acknowledge the impact she had on his career. In corresponding with Syl Schieber, it became apparent that his own story merited being told.

After graduation Syl attended college at St. Benedict's (now Benedictine College) in Atchison, Kansas. Upon earning a degree in economics there, he volunteered for the navy but failed a physical because of a deformed back. So, he went to graduate school at Notre Dame. While still taking classes in early 1971, Syl started work on a federally funded research project in Gary, Indiana partly to gather dissertation data and, by serendipity, found a wife, Vicki. They were wed at the end of 1971 at the Basilica of the Sacred Heart at Notre Dame.

Syl's experiences led him to an interest in public policy, motivated considerably by his debate experience with Mrs. Kneifl. In the summer of 1973, he joined the Office of Research and Statistics at the Social Security Administration in Washington, DC. While working there, he finished a dissertation in the momentous summer of 1974: a daughter Shannon arrived on August 8 and he was awarded a PhD on August 9. In February 1976 a second child, son Sean, arrived. Syl left Social Security at the end of 1980 and signed on as research director at a policy think tank in DC working on issues related to employers' provision of benefits

to workers - health insurance and pensions. In the fall of 1983, he joined a consulting firm working with employers on setting up and managing their employee benefit plans. He ran a research unit for the company for the next 20 years. During his last three years there, he managed a consulting unit

In the mid-1990s, Syl was appointed to a Social Security Advisory Council by the Clinton Administration. That Council's activities wrapped up in 1996. He was then appointed to the Social Security Advisory Board at the end of 1997. He served on that Board for 12 years. These were part-time service activities while still working at the consulting firm. He retired from the consulting firm at the end of September 2006, partly because of travel fatigue and also because President George W. Bush named him chair of the Social Security Advisory Board at the beginning of October 2006. He finished that activity at the end of 2009 but continued to work on retirement and health policy issues mainly doing research and writing.

Syl and his wife Vicki suffered a terrible loss when their daughter, Shannon, was murdered by a serial rapist on May 7, 1998. She was a graduate student at the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania pursuing a PhD in finance. It took the police four years to catch the assailant. Of the 14 known assaults to which he confessed, tragically Shannon's was the only one that resulted in murder.

Syl wrote that after Shannon's murder, homicide investigators and Philadelphia prosecutors wanted to pursue the death penalty. But Syl and his wife were both opposed to the death penalty on conscientious grounds. Syl and Vicki, more intensely, have worked in the ensuing years with a variety of groups trying to put an end to the use of the death penalty in the United States. Mostly notably, Syl and Vicki connected with Sr. Helen Prejean known for her book and the movie adapted from the book, Dead Man Walking. Via that connection, Vicki became involved in the establishment of the Catholic Mobilizing Network (catholicsmobilizing. org). Later, Vicki and Syl were involved in the development of a documentary on the death penalty, In the Executioner's Shadow which can be found on YouTube. At the time Syl and Vicki joined efforts to halt the death penalty, there were only 9 states that ruled it out. Today, 23 states no longer allow capital punishment and several others have it but do not use it. All of Vicki's efforts were gratis. Syl stayed with work to cover the bills and confesses that he should dispose of his keyboard, but always finds another windmill to tilt at.

Although Syl originally came to St John Seminary (Mount Michael's predecessor) to study for the priesthood, God clearly had other roles for him in the service of God's people. It is an honor to provide a glimpse of what God can accomplish through those who give themselves over to God's grace.
