Letter from Our Oblate Director

Dear Oblates,

As Monks and Oblates of Mount Michael Abbey we try to live each day "Seeking God". This daily encounter involves communication, turning to the other in community, and conversion, each day to move to the cave of the heart for silence and solitude, so that we can move out to our brothers and sisters in peace and service.

Saint Benedict fled to the cave to be the hermit, but was called out by the Spirit to encounter God in the communities which we form to "Seek God".

Each day encounter God in the burning bush of your heart. This will lead us to encounter God in the brothers and sisters with whom we live and meet.

To "Seek God" in The Rule involves this deep encounter with our brothers, the stranger, and all humankind. Everyone you encounter should be treated like "a vessel of the altar." The sick should be treated with compassion, so that they may be "truly served as Christ."

"All guests who present themselves are to be welcomed as Christ." Listen and encounter the young and respect the elders for they also bring us God's word. "If you have a dispute with someone make peace with him before the sun goes down." "And finally, never lose hope in God's mercy."

The grace for these true encounters with the Divine is a gift of the Spirit. Thank God for the gift, unwrap the gift and use it to come to the service of your brothers and sisters.

Our encounter in seeking God takes place in the ordinary activities of our lives, but they transform the ordinary into the holy.

A Nurse for All Seasons

Just hours before the forty-fifth anniversary of her death, the Venerable Hanna Chrzanowska became the first lay registered nurse and the first Benedictine oblate since the Middle Ages to be declared Blessed.



The beautification took place in the Polish city of Krakow and marks the latest stage in recognition of the grace-filled life of a talented and highly intelligent woman, full of zest for life and with a legendary sense of humor.

Her many friends, colleagues, former students and patients initiated the process of canonization. They became convinced Hanna was a special soul - a Christian example for all to appreciate, a saint. The process of canonization was initiated in 1995 and opened by Krakow diocese in 1998. The cause proceeded extremely quickly, even though Hanna was a lay person who was neither a martyr nor a Religious, nor even a member of an established church movement. It was her nursing colleagues and former students who drove the promotions of the cause.

So far as we know, Hanna had no extraordinary mystical experiences. Hers was no sugary-coated piety, but a firmly feet-on-the-ground joyful acquiescence in the will and love of God. She was born in Warsaw in 1902 into a mixed Catholic/Protestant family that had achieved considerable success in industry and land ownership. Her grandparents had set up a school for apprentices and health center for poor children in Warsaw; her aunt founded a children's hospital.

Hanna suffered from respirator and immune system deficiencies as a child and spent considerable time in the hospital. In 1920, she was among the first women in Poland to attend nursing school. She went on to become an instructor at the University School of Nurses and Hygienists, editor of the *Journal of Polish Nursing* and she helped to form the Catholic Association of Polish Nurses. She also helped prepare the first nursing legislation for the Polish state and was vice-president of the Polish nursing association, all while supporting and training the next community of nurses.

During the Second World War, Hanna's father died at Sachsenhausen concentration camp and her brother was killed in the Katyn massacre. She remained in Poland, where her work with refugees contributed significantly to the avoidance of mass homelessness and starvation in Krakow.

It was in Krakow during the darkest days of the Cold War that Hanna established the work for which she is best remembered. The unique parish-based system of nursing care she coordinated reached out to the poorest and most marginalized. It put her Gospel values into practice, devoting her gifts as a nurse at the service of those who needed them most, with quiet, cheerful determination. "From the beginning, we tried to base our work on the words of the Gospel, where so much is written about Christ's attitude toward the sick, just like our own patients with rheumatism, paralysis, or those suffering from cancer, indeed exactly like those whom the hand of Christ once touched," she said. She died on April 29, 1971. Karol Jozef Wojtyla, then Cardinal Archbishop of Krakow, celebrated her funeral.


To support her creative nursing spirituality, Hanna became a Benedictine oblate of Tyniec Abbey, which helped her deepen her already deep appreciation of prayer and involvement in Catholic activism. She was a devout practicing Catholic, who saw herself as being "single for the Lord", but she was surrounded and sustained by a veritable community of saints. She did not become who she was destined to be in isolation.

Some of these saints have been recognized by the Church - for instance, Pope Saint John Paul II; Servant of God Maria Epstein; Servant of God Teresa Strzembosz; and Venerable Servant of God Jrzy Ciesielski. There were also so may unsung saints who worked along side her, and fellow Benedictine oblate Alian Rumun.

Many Catholics still believe that to be considered a real - that is, an officially Vatican-approved and canonized - saint you have to have been dead for at least a couple hundred years. More ordinary, non-levitating saints, who during their time on Earth worked as farmers or factory workers or run homeless shelters, tend not to be considered "the right stuff". In fact, Pope Francis reminds us in his recent exhortation *Gaudete et Exsultate*, holiness is for all of us, and Heaven is full of holy souls who led quite ordinary lives in extraordinary ways; butchers, bakers, bridge builders - and nurses.

Hanna's memoirs, written at the request of her parish nurses, are being published in Poland to coincide with her beatification, together with an insightful essay, "A Nurse's Examination of Conscience". She was a very private person and her papers were burnt immediately after her death - at her request - but enough material has survived to give us a glimpse of her deep and distinct spirituality. Hanna would tell her nurses, "What dignity belongs to our profession! Christ in us serves as Christ in the other person." It was this that elevated nursing - as Hanna would add gleefully, "Fleas and all" - from a task to a joyful service.
