



Letter from the Abbot



In many cultures, the end of summer and the beginning of autumn was celebrated in thanksgiving for blessings bestowed by God, especially abundant harvests which provided sustenance through long winters. After the monastic community opened its school, St John Seminary in 1956, a variety of people sought to contribute to its success. South Omaha had become a bastion of Catholic immigrants from Eastern Europe, both prior to and following World War II. Parishioners from those south Omaha parishes were eager to support the seminary. Mount Michael's Fall Festival was created in cooperation with groups from these parishes to provide financial support to the fledgling seminary. The Saint John Seminary Association was created both to organize and to recognize the volunteers who made the early festivals such a success. The Fall Festival was conceived as a harvest festival - a celebration of God's blessings. As with many parish festivals, the Fall Festival offered games of chance, food and entertainment to attract visitors. The booths used to stage the games and to offer the food were staffed by volunteers from the Association. Perhaps most importantly, the Fall Festival offered an opportunity for students, alumni, friends and families of Mount Michael to enjoy one another's company in a warm and relaxing setting.

To keep the festival fresh and interesting, the attractions to draw visitors changed through the years. In the late 1960s, a troop of sky divers entertained the crowds. I might add parenthetically that no monks were required to jump out of airplanes. One year, Fr Jospeh Peters who was then the director of development boarded a hot air balloon to pass over the festival grounds. That particular year, it happened to be a rather miserable rainy day. So the balloon did not go very high and the ride did not last very long. But Fr Joseph, wet and chilly, gamely waved from the balloon as it sailed overhead. Probably the largest festival crowd showed up during the era of Evel Knievel. A motorcyclist jumped a large number of buses parked side by side. It was an impressive feat, requiring the cyclist to be traveling about 70 mph as his cycle left the ramp. Another large crowd appeared during the days of the CB (citizen band) radio craze. Truckers adopted aliases to identify themselves over the radio. The conversation would go something like, "This is Dust Devil. What's your handle, come on?" A commercial for Old Home Bread featured the waitress Mavis who served the truckers who stopped at her cafe. The commercial was backed by a song titled The Old Home Fill-er Keep on Trucking Cafe. Mavis, who was quite popular, signed autographs and greeted the

crowds coming to enjoy the festival. For a few years, a car show also brought enthusiasts of vintage vehicles to the campus. In election years, the festival would be home to politicians shaking hands and kissing babies.

Aside from the major attraction, the festival commonly featured various performances to entertain the crowds. Small bands, soloists and dance troupes would take the stage. For many years, a small carnival would also contributed to the fun. Kids of all ages could ride twirling teapots, a small rollercoaster and a carousel along other rides. Br Mel would lead horses so that kids could enjoy a ride. The festival also had at various times a flea market, an arts and crafts show, and a farmer's market where produce and canned goods could be purchased. There was a petting zoo, hay rack rides, clowns, face painting, bounce houses, and a climbing wall. Some years the festival opened with a parade for special Olympians who then competed throughout the morning in flag football.

Then the coronavirus arrived. Impossible for people to assemble in large crowds. What to do? Fortunately, the development office was able to stage a virtual festival which was strictly on online affair. Thanks to the generosity of the Mount Michael faithful, even an online event proved to be successful. Last year, an abbreviated festival allowed people to return to campus. The festival began with a celebration of the Eucharist on the football field followed by a pancake breakfast in the gym. Br Jerome's flea market, Fr John's garden market, food and bounce houses provided activities for festival goers to enjoy. Even the limited event was a success. This year we are hoping to have a festival which more resembles those that people remember. The development office has tried to incorporate the most missed events of previous years. There will be a cake walk and a cake booth. There will be a beer garden. There will be more options for food. But most importantly there will be people there who love Mount Michael, who enjoy seeing the monks and other old friends, and who want to support our apostolates. For that we will be forever grateful. It is an occasion of celebration. A festival at the end of summer all the love and care we enjoy which will carry us through the winter. God bless you all. God has certainly blessed us through you.

Over the summer of 2023 the Mount Michael campus saw a series of projects unlike what we have seen in some time. Many of these are the result of generous donors, committed staff, and a supportive monastic community!



One major project that has been worked on all summer is the installation of six new tennis courts. These courts are located just north of the baseball field. These new courts will allow Mount Michael to host more tournaments, support our tremendous team and coaches, and be used for lessons all summer long. As of this writing our plan is to keep the older courts and use them for pickleball and recreational space for the students. These new courts are set to be completed by the time school starts.

We were able to start this project due to the generosity of several donors. Mount Michael has a strong history of a very successful tennis program. In gratitude, several donors, past players, and their families, have contributed. The second major project that has been worked on all summer is a new track. For those of you who are familiar with our older track, you know that it was not an official-sized track. It lacked the proper surface, the number of lanes was limited to six, and we could not host

meets. We also lacked the complete, and official, ancillary aspects like pole vault, shot put, discus, long jump, and high



jump areas. This track will have all those things and Mount Michael Benedictine School will now be able to host meets. This is going to offer an excellent opportunity to welcome schools and visitors to our campus as we plan these meets! Our track team will also be able to train and compete on an official sized track with all the amenities! This project is the result of two generous donors. The track will be ready for our spring season.

Another project this summer has been some modifications and changes to the freshman dorm living area. For the past few years, the old library in the Benedict building has been used as the bunk room for the freshman. We are now going to use that space as the study area for the freshman. We are making a rec room out of the other space, moving in games and such, to allow for a place for the students to relax without having to go to the Armory. The freshman will be living in rooms of six down the hall from the bunk room. These rooms will be sparsely furnished with no desks. The idea is to retain the community aspect of still living and working together as a class.



Moving our advancement/development office into the St. Benedict building is our last major, new project. Currently their offices are in the white building just south of our campus

entrance. They will now be located on the main floor of the Benedict building across from our business offices. This will bring them closer to the heart of the campus. Being proximate to the main school buildings and our offices will allow for easier communication and more efficiency.

In the fall of 2019, Mount Michael entered a contract with the consulting firm, Gonser Gerber, to work on a new strategic five-year plan. This firm had focus groups, surveys and meetings that resulted in hundreds of people giving input on the future of Mount Michael Benedictine School. The plan was delivered in February of 2020. Of course, in March of 2020 we were hit with a worldwide pandemic. Since that time, we have found some wonderful successes with the plan. But we have also found that, due to some changes and forces beyond our control, some of our priorities have shifted.

This summer our management team met with a consultant, Jim Cushing, from Des Moines. Jim is currently working with our team to reappraise, realign and refresh the strategic plan as wo go into these next few years. We will keep you posted on any significant changes.

Lastly, I would like to welcome our newest staff members for the 2023-24 school year.





SCAN TO LEARN MORE



Thomas Merton and Mount Michael

For Mount Michael alumni, we all have memories that will last a lifetime. My own memories include a lecture by Fr. Nicholas Nittler, which I believe occurred in a senior theology course, probably in 1986. Fr. Nicholas was an engaging lecturer, who brought tremendous life to the classroom. During one class meeting, he taught us about Thomas Merton, a Trappist monk from the Abbey of Gethsemani in Kentucky.

Trappist monks rise for prayer at 3:30 a.m., and pray six additional times per day, along with a mass in between. Like the Mount's Benedictines, Trappists take a vow of stability to live in their monastery, but they also practice silence most of the day. Their official religious affiliation is the Order of the Cistercian of the Strict Observance, which says a lot about this brand of monks.

Fr. Nicholas spoke with awe and fascination about Merton. Despite his strict and austere lifestyle, Merton was a prolific author, who wrote on race relations, economic issues, and international politics. He also had a welcoming ecumenical spirit, and thus sought to find commonalities between Catholicism and other religious practices. In many ways, he is considered the most important thinker in the 20th century about Catholic contemplation and prayer.

Despite his cloistered life, Merton maintained an expansive correspondence through letters with other scholars, poets, theologians and many friends. This is what especially intrigued Fr. Nicholas, who noted the paradox of Merton's cloistered life and simultaneously his long list of global correspondences.

Merton's most widely read book was his autobiography, *The Seven Story Mountain*, which speaks about his conversion to Catholicism and his decision to live as a Trappist monk. As an undergraduate at Marquette University, a friend of mine encouraged me to read this book, which I did, in part because Fr. Nicholas planted the seed and interest in Merton. Like many, I found the book fascinating and have since had a strong interest in Merton and the Trappists at Gethsemani.

This lifelong interest recently culminated with a visit to Gethsemani this spring. I have developed a correspondence with Br. Paul Quenon, a Trappist at Gethsemani, due in part to his own book, In Praise of the Useless Life: A Monk's Memoir. Br. Paul studied as a novice under Merton in the late 1950s and early 1960s, and oversees Merton's hermitage, right outside of the monastery. Members of my family joined me as Br. Paul showed us where Merton lived, and the simple and modest hermitage that Merton inhabited. It was a true joy to experience.

The foundation for these experiences were set at Mount Michael. Later in life, I also recall conversations about Merton with Mount Michael monks, Fr. Bernard and Fr. John, who too had strong interests in Merton. In this respect, my Mount Michael education continues to shape my life and steer my ongoing interests and development. What a priceless gift to receive from Mount Michael.



KEVIN JEWELL '14

I met Kevin for the first-time during preseason football workouts our freshman year. As soon as I met him, I was instantly unsure about him. His big personality, confidence and sarcastic wit didn't mesh well with my bigger personality, confidence, and sarcastic wit. We began to butt heads and lead to frustration as I was a first-string wide receiver, and he was third-string quarterback. The disdain was evident for a majority of our football season, until we played away at Roncalli under the Friday night lights. Late in the game with Kevin at the helm, the play call came in... "I-Pro Right, Sprint Pass Right." We got into formation, ran the play, and Kevin shocked the world and threw a 40-yard bomb and hit me in stride as I made my way into the endzone untouched. He never showed any of those skills during preseason workouts. Some might say we've been great friends ever since.

We had a great friendship during our time at The Mount. Kevin was as busy as ever there with a chip on his shoulder and seemingly something to prove. He played four years of football, basketball, and baseball in addition to extracurriculars. Ultimately, that propelled him to higher education at Creighton University where we'd spend the next four years of our lives together; again. I'm thankful we both ended up at Creighton where we became even better friends. It was there where I realized what type of impression he was really trying to make.

No matter what the crowd or audience, he made an impact on everyone. Kevin gave about every ounce he had to his sports teams and to the classroom. Everyone that knows Kevin understands how important sports are to him, especially basketball. "After Mount Michael, I was a student manager for the men's basketball team at Creighton for four years. I

helped at practice and around the office doing whatever the team needed from laundry and rebounding as a freshman and sophomore to, by the time I was a senior, being able to help with scouting opponents and recruiting. I also got to go on a good majority of our road trips and help the team, as well

as see some of the great basketball venues across the country. It was a very special experience to be around such a high-level basketball program and high-level people."

Although he only scored 12 points on 6/51 shot attempts in his high school varsity basketball career, he continued to press on with his love for the game. "During my summers, I also worked a bunch of different basketball camps at schools across the United States. It ended up being seven different schools - Wisconsin, Oregon, South Dakota State, Missouri, Oklahoma, Purdue, and Notre Dame.

Through all those different camps, as well as my time at Creighton hosting visiting teams for shoot arounds and practices, I was able to make enough connections to land as a graduate assistant at Wisconsin. I spent two seasons up there in a similar capacity to Creighton - helping the team with whatever they needed but spent a lot of my time on graphics, recruiting, as well as some analytical work. I also pursued a master's degree in educational leadership and policy analysis. My second year, we were fortunate enough to win the Big Ten Regular Season Championship. Unfortunately, less than a week later, our season and the world were shut down due to COVID-19. I moved home for a few months and again thanks to some previous connections, was able to land at the University of Nebraska-Omaha as the Director of Operations. I handled all our travel, scheduling, and logistical issues for the team and staff. It was an incredible learning experience especially given the challenges of COVID-19."

What are you doing now?

Again leaning back on my previous connections, I was able to move on from UNO to work for a former boss of mine, Steve Lutz. Coach Lutz was an assistant coach my first three years at Creighton, and we formed a good enough relationship to have him ask me to come be his video coordinator at Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, in the Southland Conference. I spent my first season here as the video coordinator, handling all our practice and game film, as well as overseeing all our scouting efforts. After my first year, I made the switch to being our Director of Operations which brought me back

to doing travel, meals, scheduling, as well as helping with academics, community service, equipment, and a whole litany of other things. We were fortunate in our two seasons here to win back-to-back Southland Conference Tournament Championships, as well as the Regular Season Championship in our second season here. We had back-to-back NCAA Tournament Appearances including our school's first ever win in the NCAA Tournament by defeating Southeast Missouri State. Being a part of that team will be a memory that I cherish for the rest of my life. I'm currently entering my third year here and continuing to oversee our operations.

What's next for you?

The coaching profession can be a long and winding road without a ton of direction and clarity. I think beyond trying to plan my next move, I hope to continue to search for positions where I can grow and learn and use the gifts that I was given in a fun way. I obviously would love to stay in the basketball profession and hope that when the time is right, I am able to become a head coach somewhere.

What advice do you have for current students who want to make the most out of their experience at Mount Michael?

Do not miss an opportunity to experience something Mount Michael provides. It is such a unique, yet fulfilling four years, and I think every chance one gets to participate in a Mount Michael event whether it be the Fall Festival or a home basketball game, you will be better for it. I tried to participate and do as much as possible in my four years and I cannot think of an experience that I was not better off for. Even something as simple as bringing home international students on the weekend is something that you rarely have the chance to do again in life. I am forever grateful for so many of the bonds and connections that I formed in my time there and I don't think that would have happened if I did not lean into everything that was going on out there. Four years that last a lifetime is truly the case.

What would you say to a family considering MM for their son?

I always keep up through all the different social media channels, reading the Michaeleen and obviously keeping up with my classmates on a daily and weekly basis. I enjoyed being able to play in many alumni tournaments and even attending a few basketball games when I was back in Omaha. Next year will be my tenyear reunion and I hope to be able to get back to see some old classmates and participate in the golf outing again. I know my brothers have participated on the alumni board, coached some junior Knights, as well as some of the current teams since their graduation as well. I would try to inspire to alumni to become involved by taking the same attitude they did when they were at school - you want to leave something better than you found it.

To this day, Kevin still has a passion for The Mount and continues to call on alumni to share in his efforts to see the school get better and better.

I think as alums, we all take a collective interest in wanting to see Mount Michael grow and become better and that only improves by having alums that contribute and take an active role in its growth.

I know I would not be the person
I am today without the Mount, and
I would think the Mount would say the same about many of its alumni.

Kevin truly takes each opportunity to become a better version of himself and seeks to better those people and places around him and has a one-of-a-kind resume to show for it. People like Kevin don't come around often, and for that I feel blessed have crossed paths with him when I did.




