Letter from the Abbot

Maintaining identity in a changing world is a challenge. The church founded by Christ and his apostles has endured through the centuries to this day, though fractured into many denominations. For Roman Catholics, the successors to the apostles, that is the bishop of Rome and the bishops of dioceses world-wide are integral to maintaining our identity as members of the Body of Christ.

This summer has been one of change for the people in the archdiocese of Omaha. Archbishop Lucas reached retirement age. I attended the installation Eucharist for his successor, Archbishop Michael McGovern. Pope Francis died, and the college of cardinals elected Cardinal Robert Prevost to be pope. He chose the name Leo XIV. In some fashion or another, I have been privileged to witness the passing of the torch for both archbishops and popes. Here is a brief account of how the archbishops and popes have touched my life.

When I first arrived at St. John Seminary (predecessor to Mount Michael Benedictine), the archbishop of Omaha was Gerald T. Bergan. Our gym is honored with his name. While I was a student, each year he made a visit to the seminary. Inevitably, after a Eucharistic celebration with the monastic community and the seminarians, he would give all the seminarians the rest of the day off from classes. The monastic prefects were not as happy about the free day as the seminarians. After all, what could possibly go wrong with some 200 teenagers with nothing to do? After Archbishop Bergan retired in 1969, he was succeeded by his auxiliary, Archbishop Daniel Sheehan. Archbishop Sheehan ordained me to the priesthood. After Archbishop Sheehan retired in 1993, the new archbishop became Elden Curtiss. Archbishop Curtiss had been a staff member at Mount Angel in Oregon, so he was familiar with Benedictine monasticism. He officiated at my blessing as abbot in 2007. Once Archbishop Curtiss retired in 2009, he was succeeded by Archbishop George Lucas. At the time, the small joke was that the new archbishop was not the George Lucas of Star Wars fame. I was fortunate to attend both the installation of Archbishop Lucas and in early May of this year, the installation of Archbishop McGovern. Both events were impressive and beautiful celebrations of the continuity of the Catholic church in northeast Nebraska.

When I began grade school in my hometown, our classroom had a photo of the current pope, Pius XII. While serving with the Army Air Corps during World War II, my father along with other soldiers saw Pius XII at an audience in St. Peter's square in Rome. Pius was succeeded in 1958 by Pope John XXIII, who convened the Second Vatican Council. The Italian word aggiornamento, which means updating, described efforts of the council to bring the church into the modern world. Among many reforms, that council brought the vernacular to the celebration of the Eucharist. Pope Paul VI followed next, elected in 1963. He was the first pope that I saw in person. While I was in theology, I had the great good fortune to spend a semester studying in the Holy Land in the spring of 1976. On the way home, we traveled through Rome and stayed at Sant'Anselmo, the Benedictine monastery on the Aventine hill. While there, we attended an audience with Paul VI at the Papal Audience Hall. After Paul VI died, his 33-day successor was John Paul I. The cardinals apparently were determined not to have to re-convene in such a short span of time, so the next pope elected was young, John

Paul II. In October of 1979, Pope John Paul II traveled to Des Moines to celebrate the Eucharist at the Living History Farms. We packed up all the students and faculty in buses. Left early in the morning for the drive to Des Moines to attend that celebration. What began as a raw October morning turned into a lovely October afternoon as John Paul II celebrated the Eucharist. It was a memorable event for everyone privileged to take part. Because he had a long papacy, I saw Pope John Paul II again a couple of times, mostly at general audiences when I was traveling with groups in Italy. After I was elected abbot, I attended Congress of Abbots which is held every four years at Sant'Anselmo in Rome. That gathering was also an occasion for an audience with the Pope. I saw Pope Benedict XVI, John Paul's successor at Castel Gandolfo, the papal retreat just outside Rome. Finally, at a Congress of Abbots in 2016, the assembled abbots had a private audience with Pope Francis inside Vatican City. He was the first and to date the only pope with whom I ever shook hands. We also saw Pope Francis at the Congress of 2024, but this was a larger gathering at St Peter's Square. He had just returned from a trip to southeast Asia and was in a wheelchair. But he greeted the faithful gathered in the Square, nonetheless. Sadly, Pope Francis died not long after.

The day after Archbishop McGovern was installed as archbishop of Omaha, the college of cardinals elected Cardinal Robert Prevost to be the next pope. I immediately had messages from my sisters asking what I thought about the new pope. I had to confess that I had never heard of him before. But I think we can draw some conclusions from his choice of name, Leo XIV.

Leo is the Latin word for lion. The very first Pope Leo was the man who persuaded Attila the Hun not to sack the city of Rome. Certainly, a bit of leonine courage that. Pope Leo III crowned Charlemagne emperor of the Romans. But Leo's immediate predecessor of the same name is Leo XIII. His famed and socially progressive encyclical Rerum Novarum addressed inequalities in the wake of the industrial revolution. Pope Leo XIII also composed the prayer to St. Michael that is used by many parishes immediately following the conclusion of the Eucharist. "St. Michael the Archangel defend us in battle...cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits." I suspect Pope Leo XIV will be a defender of the faith, but also a man sensitive to the needs of the disadvantaged and marginalized.



When I was in grade school, I never imagined that I would cross paths with so many bishops, nor ever even see a pope. But God has ways of touching our lives unexpectedly. Perhaps that alone speaks to the continuity of grace that maintains our church, and maybe more importantly, sustains the people of God, the body of Christ.

Mount Michael Benedictine School:

Campus Life



The residential program at Mount Michael Benedictine School sets it apart from all the local metropolitan high schools both public and private. It is fundamental and foundational to our identity. Hundreds of our alumni count, and value, the great impact the residential program has had on them. Being a boarding school adds an element to campus life not found everywhere. It is unique and transformative. We consider it extremely meaningful and a key to our identity.

The residential schedule has remained the same over the past fifty-five years. Five-day boarders arrive Sunday evening or Monday morning, and students follow a consistent schedule from the time they wake up to the 90-minute study hall in the evening to prayer before lights out. This allows for a disciplined approach to homework and studies. This summer we are renovating fortytwo of our dormitory rooms. Each of these rooms will have new desks, paint, sinks, and beds. New drywall will be installed where needed. Each room will have, for the first time ever, wallto-wall carpeting. The light fixtures will be replaced with state-of-the-art lights, allowing for brighter rooms with less energy used. New closets will be built to replace the old ones. Each room will undergo a complete facelift.

We are currently raising funds for this important project. For those wishing to donate, we have naming opportunities available for each room. A personalized nameplate will be available for each \$6,000 dollars raised. Maybe you, or your Mount Michael roommate would like to contribute to a plate displayed on your old dorm room.

We also have some personnel changes for the upcoming 2025-26 school year. A new dean of students has been hired who will also oversee our residential program. Mr. Tyler Linder will start working this summer. He comes to us from Columbus Scotus, where he has taught theology for the last thirteen years and has been their head football coach for the past eleven years. Our residential program will focus on enhancing leadership opportunities, spiritual life, mentoring and application of our core Benedictine values. Mr. Linder is looking forward to working with our young men and making these goals a reality.

We want to acknowledge and thank the many generous donors at this year's Night of Knights dinner and auction. Through their generosity money was raised to begin work on two major renovations to the gym. One is the replacement of the bleachers. The current bleachers are not the original ones but have been in service for well over twenty years. They have had to be repaired several times over the years. The second aspect to our gym renewal project will be repairing the floor and offering complete resurfacing, greatly changing our current design. While we think of the gym as a place where basketball games get played, it also serves Mount Michael in many ways. We have hosted all-school Masses, summer camps, various sports camps, and probably one of the greatest annual events that takes place in the

gym is our graduation. It is a tradition that brings our community together to celebrate. Enhancing that space will add to the sanctity of our graduation.

If you have already supported our current fundraising endeavors, I will say thank you! If you have not, this is a great opportunity to give so that current and future Mount Michael students can experience both the gift that a residential program offers and a gym that they can be proud of.

Constructing the caskets and urns is not my role in this ministry. Ever since Br. Andrew Sorensen OSB passed, there has not been a monk of Mount Michael who has continued constructing the caskets and urns. Many of our readers have wished me well in the carpentry shop. Thank you but I am not in the carpenter shop nor is there a shop anymore!

Much has changed since Br. Andrew, the designer of our caskets, has passed. In fact, there is no longer a carpentry shop on campus. Br. Andrew's shop was in the school building proper, and as our school grew larger and larger the space was needed for the school. We no longer have a carpentry shop or a carpenter as such.

When the monks decided to provide caskets for the public, we outsourced construction of the caskets. Then when I was asked to take over the ministry, one of my many cousins who was very capable as a carpenter stepped up to the plate and inquired if he could do the construction. Paul Dohmen from Columbus, Nebraska is the cousin of mine who wanted to be a part of this ministry. And so, it happened. Paul's first casket was made around 2010, and it his skill surprised me. He simply made the casket after taking some measurements of one of Br. Andrew's and one day he showed up with it in his pick-up. From that day on, Paul was the master of the caskets in his shop in Columbus. Up until recently, Paul made all the Mount Michael caskets. He made well over 100 in that time period.

Paul and I share the same birth date: January 23. But he has me by 13 years. He turned 89 this past January, an age when constructing a casket was becoming too much. But Paul and his wife, Joyce always reminded me of this saying, "It is better to wear out, than to rust out". Paul is now making

nativity sets—a little less demanding. He makes many for me to sell here at Mount Michael. And since St. Francis was the originator of Nativity sets - the creche - this ministry is even more Franciscan! It all seems to fit very well with my Franciscan background and Paul's as well. He was born just a mile away from St. Bernard, Nebraska. It was where my mother lived as a young girl and very likely where she enrobed herself with my great uncle's habit.

Our present constructor of Mount Michael caskets and urns is Randy Hellerich. He is a retired pilot and is very capable as a carpenter. Randy lives very near Mount Michael, and near Menard's where he can purchase the wood for the caskets. Randy and I have made a few changes in Br. Andrew's original design to simplify things. However, we have remained true to Br. Andrew's creativity and simplicity. Mount Michael caskets and urns can be viewed any time at the Guest House.

At this point in history, we still do not have a carpentry shop at Mount Michael. Both of our carpenters create their products in their own shops with their own tools.

So, you might ask: "What is your role in the casket ministry, Fr. John?" I take all the phone calls and inquiries. I, along with the Advancement office, create the flyers and website information about the caskets. I make all the contacts with funeral homes and even at times deliver a casket or urn to a funeral home.

It has been a very rewarding opportunity to be a participant in

this ministry at Mount Michael. Many people are appreciative of the simplicity of carpentry work and likewise appreciate the monastic aspect of it all.

On behalf of my community, I would like to thank Paul and Randy particularly, but also those who choose to participate in a ministry that is so monastic. Blessings to all of you and know that all are remembered in our prayers.

It was so delicious that we thought about making her "French Style Chicken" as a meal at the Guest House in honor of Rita.

An organization that Rita worked tirelessly for was EPS– Essential Pregnancy Servies. She helped with many, many fundraisers over the years. And one way she could directly help was her adeptness at crocheting shawls. She ordered unusually bright colored, loose yarn from different countries. The shawls were absolutely stunning. She crocheted many shawls and donated all the money to EPS. There is some of her work still at the Guest House at this time.

Rita loved coming out to Mount Michael and she would help at the Guest House in any way she could. Eventually she thought it would be good to basically run the Flea Market. Some of the Saturdays were very hot days. But dear Rita loved the hot weather and direct sun. She would sit out in front of the barn waiting for customers and helping them. In her spare time, she would crochet. She was always invited to sit under the umbrella, but she loved the sun, indeed she did. She just wanted to be in the sun!

Rita was well aware of how the Oblate Program of Mount Michael was growing and she was so pleased about that. She was determined to help in any way so could. But she knew that as she aged, it wasn't as easy to do lots of physical work anymore. So, she decided that her money could help the program as well. Dear Rita, made sure that we could continue to finance the Oblate Program, especially with the students. So, Rita gave Mount Michael a very generous donation to the program before she passed into eternal life.

Mount Michael wishes to acknowledge Rita's generosity and express our gratitude to her family. Truth be told, it will be hard to ever forget Rita. She was quite a talker! But her actions have spoken much louder than her words.

MISSION & MINISTRY

As a rising high school senior, in July 2009, I attended a social justice immersion program through the Archdiocese of Baltimore. The week-long camp challenged high school students from different parts of Maryland to learn about the injustices impacting Baltimore City and how we could be advocates for change. During the week, we visited various service agencies that promote justice in Baltimore. Before we entered our first service site, our leader told us that we might be taken outside of our comfort



zones. She said that the role of the Catholic Church—especially in service and justice—is to make the comfortable uncomfortable.

In many ways, this piece of advice came to shape my entire life. After that week, I dedicated much of my teen, college, and young adult years to service, often finding myself in situations that made me uncomfortable. What I found in those moments was that, in my discomfort, I was encountering Jesus. When developing ideas about adding a service day into the school calendar for each grade, that phrase-make the comfortable uncomfortable-was at the forefront of my mind. The goal for the service days was for our students to become uncomfortable so that they, too, could encounter Jesus.

When our students embarked on their service days to the Heart Ministry Center and Siena Francis House, many of them were uncomfortable. They encountered and met people who are unhoused, people recently released from prison, people addicted to drugs, people striving for recovery from those addictions, and people struggling to put food on the table—people whom I hope they realized are not all that different from them. People who reflected the face of Christ. People who are Jesus. In Matthew 25, we hear the words: "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?' And the king will say to them in reply, 'Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me." On their service days, our students embodied this Gospel passage.

If the goal of service is to make the comfortable uncomfortable so that they can encounter Christ, then our time at the Heart Ministry Center and Siena Francis House was well spent. We were with Jesus in every second that we were there. My hope, as we continue to integrate new service opportunities into different aspects of Mount Michael, is that our students never stay comfortable—and that they seek out discomfort so they can continue to encounter Christ.

It made me appreciate my ability to go to a private school, my ability to have food on my table, and my appreciation for my family. The people I met may not have some of those luxuries, but they had the strength to ask for help.





ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

When people hear that there are five boys in our family, they typically respond in one of two ways: "Your poor mother," or "That's enough to field a basketball team." Luke ('18) is fourth in the starting lineup, following Vince ('11), me (Nate, '12), Sam ('16), but ahead of Drew ('23). The decision to attend Mount Michael was made long before eighth grade, and Luke certainly had big shoes to fill. Please don't misread this as self-indulgent. Mount Michael faculty will acknowledge this as a tip of the hat to Vince, not to Sam or me. Fortunately for all of us though, the last impression of the Van Haute tenure at Mount Michael was left in Drew's hands.

As I asked Luke to reflect on his time at Mount Michael and the impact it had on him, the word "brotherhood" kept coming up.

Now, as one of five, the concept wasn't new to him. But over his four years at Mount Michael, he learned that brotherhood was much more than backyard scuffles and oversized hand-me-downs. It was built on everyday moments- dodging demerits, cramming for exams, and building forts in the gullies. Brotherhood became a deeprooted loyalty and a commitment to lifting each other higher, a bond that exists to this day with many of his classmates. While we spoke a lot about brotherhood, it was clear that some of the most meaningful connections came from outside of his Papillion/La Vista comfort zone.

For Luke, Mount Michael's approach to welcoming international students expanded the very idea of what brotherhood could be. Some of his closest friendships were with classmates whose hometowns he couldn't even pronounce in his freshman year.

"I loved the fact that at the Mount, we didn't have foreignexchange students who were there one semester and gone the next. We had international students from South Korea, China, Mexico, and other countries- guys who stuck with us from freshman year to graduation."

For all of us Van Hautes, these students became brothers and, more often than not, weekend guests at our house. Our parents usually didn't realize an extra guest was coming until we pulled into the driveway on Friday evening, but they always made room. As a bonus, their presence allowed us to sidestep lectures about failed quizzes or well-deserved demerits.

For Luke, the cross-cultural exchange went beyond Omaha. Without these bonds or trips to Mexico during high school, Luke recognizes that he likely would not be where he is now, running his health and mindfulness coaching business from Mexico City. He first visited classmate Sebastian Alegrett ('18) in his sophomore year, and he returned the next two years with mission trips led by Mr. Cormier. Reflecting on these trips, Luke jokingly rattled off the usual post-mission trip reflections of "recognizing my privilege" and "seeing how happy people could be with so little". Beneath the clichés, something deeper stuck with him. Witnessing the Benedictine values of hospitality and balance helped him understand that caring for others and caring for yourself are not in conflict, but deeply connected. Returning to the Mount, he approached Spanish classes with new seriousness. Weightlifting with Mr. Struckman wasn't just about "gains" and "getting swole". He thinks this was the turning point, the moment his professional goals took root, and he attributes his passion for entrepreneurship and holistic health to the final years at Mount Michael.

⁶⁶ I remember above our freshman dorm painted 'Mens Sana in Corpore Sano', a sound mind in a healthy body," he said. "At the time, I probably didn't think much of it. But now, it's the core of everything I try to instill in the individuals I coach. ⁹⁹

In his practice, he helps clients bridge the gap between where they are and where they want to be. He guides them toward tangible habits, from regular workouts to daily meditations, that anchor their momentum and catalyze a happier, healthier life. After four years, he has worked with over 60 clients, 15 of whom are Mount Michael graduates spanning four decades of graduation years. Channeling my Sharleen Ball journalism skills, I required him to compare himself to a Mount Michael coach. He responded, "I'd like to think I'm a disciple of John Gathje, helping my clients realize that winning doesn't happen overnight. It's the result of putting in the miles, week after week. That's when the victories start to show up."

Luke's advice to current students is predictably zen- "Enjoy every moment. The four years go much faster than you think." And to fellow alumni, Luke encourages us all to realize that being a Mount Michael advocate goes beyond financial support (likely because he hasn't yet established an endowment). All of us have had moments at events, where upon mentioning the Mount to a stranger, they'll respond, "My nephew is thinking about going there. Would you recommend it?" Luke always gives a resonant yes. He acknowledges that things may be different now-a new building, teachers, extracurricular activities, and student body, but some things are timeless about Mount Michael, brotherhood and Benedictine values at the top of the list.

Watching my brother's journey unfold, I realize that Mount Michael didn't necessarily make life easier, but richer. It gave him more brothers than he already had, and the understanding that success isn't measured by achievements, but instead by how you lift up others. Though I risk ridicule from Vince, Sam, and Drew, I'll wholeheartedly admit it- I'm proud of the man he's become.


